



#### A Call to Care for the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship

On January 15, 2019, the Governing Board of the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship (CBF) voted unanimously to elect the Rev. Dr. Paul Baxley as its fourth Executive Coordinator. I want to tell you why I believe their decision will prove to be a watershed moment for Cooperative Baptists, and why this is good news for our particular congregation.

As a student, friend, and colleague of Paul's for nearly 30 years, and as a witness to the transformational impact he's had on every institution he's served—whether as a pastor, chaplain, or administrator—I can say with confidence that neither CBF nor any other denominational body in America has seen many leaders quite like him. He exemplifies an extraordinary combination of love for the

church, theological acumen, strategic thinking, and collaborative leadership. Time and again, he has gone about his work with little fanfare, inviting the people around him to discover their own gifts, and giving them the room and time they need

to take ownership and thrive in their roles.

Paul is not a stranger to First Baptist Church of Asheville, having preached at my installation service in October 2016. I remember several of our members commenting on his sermon with great appreciation. I've known Paul since he came to serve as Associate Minister of Education and Youth at First Baptist Church of Henderson, NC, where I grew up and discerned a call to ordained ministry. Were it not for his pastoral leadership and ministerial gifts, I would not be a minister today.


Yet, Paul's election matters for all of us because it means we can expect strong leadership from an office that, going forward, will require both careful wisdom and infectious enthusiasm. The global church continues to experience a kind of rapid change rarely seen across its 2000-year history. As disciples committed to the church's continued faithfulness, cooperative local and global missions, and rigorous theological education, the promise of strong leadership in these areas should give us cause for celebration.

This new day is also a compelling reason for our church to reflect on and recommit to our participation in the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship. We have been a flagship church for CBF since its inception in 1991. Our pastor emeritus, Cecil Sherman (1964-84), served as CBF's first Executive Coordinator. Many of our church staff over the years have graduated from CBF-partner theological schools. FBCA members have served or are currently serving on CBF state and national councils. Our own Jenny Jenkins is a CBF missionary doing phenomenal work for God's kingdom in Grand Goâve, Haiti. As well, our church budget remains a testament to the crucial relationships with Baptist theological schools, as well as other church and para-church institutions, that have made possible a Baptist Christian witness in America and around the world.

CBF exists to help Baptists do together what we cannot do alone. Because of our particular church's size and the resources at our disposal, it can be easy to think of FBCA as an island, needing little help from others to share the gospel. As our congregation continues to grow with members from diverse denominational and non-denominational backgrounds, we also could be tempted to think that denominations no longer matter for churches like ours.



# New Bible Study: Entering the Passion of Holy Week Welcome Breakfast and Introduction • February 24 Covenant Group Study • March 3 - April 14 Sundays at 9:00 a.m. • MB356 • Facilitated by Debbie and Steve Miller

Jesus' final days were full of risk. Every move he made was filled with anticipation, danger, and the potential for great loss or great reward. Jesus risked his reputation when he entered Jerusalem in a victory parade. He risked his life when he dared to teach in the Temple. His followers risked everything when they left behind their homes or anointed him with costly perfume. We take risks as we read and re-read these stories, finding new meanings and new challenges.

In the weeks leading up to Holy Week, this study will provide a rich and challenging learning experience to prepare participants to more meaningfully experience the costs and challenges surrounding the Passion story. The resource that will guide this study is *Entering the Passion of Jesus:* 

*A Beginner's Guide to Holy Week*, written by biblical scholar and professor at Vanderbilt University Divinity School, Amy-Jill Levine. In her book, she explores how the text raises ethical and spiritual questions for the reader, and how we all face risk in our Christian experience.

Participants will covenant together to be present weekly, prepare by reading before each meeting, pray for one another, and participate in discussion. Space is limited for this covenant group. #### Campus Master Plan

In March of 2017, the One Oak Ad Hoc Committee was formed to explore how to best use the One Oak property in support of the mission and ministry of our church. The committee soon realized that consideration needed to be given to our entire campus. As a result, a property survey was conducted, legal work was done on deeds and easements, and some initial concept drawings were made.


In June of 2018, the committee expanded to 14 members and was renamed the Campus Master Plan Ad Hoc Committee. The work of the new committee is focused on three areas: increased income for the maintenance and preservation of our historic building, additional parking, and exploration of how we might extend ministry into new spaces on our campus. Ministry possibilities suggested to us by the deacons include: workforce housing, work place training and support, community services hub, commercial spaces, and outdoor gathering areas.

To further our knowledge and understanding, we have had productive, engaging conversations with our neighbors at the YMCA and with the State Employees Credit Union, our anchor tenant at One Oak. Our conversations will soon expand to include municipal agencies as well as other non-profits.




#### VIA KARIS, Part 5: Creation



#### Living the Way of Jesus in the Hills of Haiti First Baptist Church of Asheville Mission Team


The gospel comes alive as we serve in Haiti. Across the first week of February, 12 members and friends of First Baptist Church of Asheville (FBCA) worked alongside Jenny Jenkins, FBCA member and CBF field personnel in that country for more than 10 years. Each day brought healing through dental, medical, and vision care offered by the team. Every encounter was marked by prayer. For Bob Busey, team leader, this was his eighth trip to the hills around Grand Goave. Listen just a bit to their reflections across the week...

- Rex Henderson and Valerie Lenhart joined the medical team in caring for over 160 patients with Gloria Cobb and Lisa Barnett filling over 800 prescriptions. Sandra Martin assisted.
- Dr. Kasee Metcalf (dentist) cared for a patient for a third time demonstrating some of the continuity of care Jenny hopes to see. The dental group pulled more than 200 teeth across 60 cases, all done in a make-shift clinic of the church with patients lying on a cot. Caroline Cooper and Marie Henderson rounded out the dental group.
- Randall Barnett and Marilyn Bollinger shared 80 pairs of glasses and dozens more of the sunglasses FBCA friends gave.
- Peggy Henderson and others encouraged, hydrated, and shared hugs with all who came to the daily clinics.



The team weaved joyful worship and evening devotions across these days of care. Walks down the mountain invited new intersections for the group to attend to the beauty of God's creation found in each smiling face or during a quiet walk along the blue waters. The future holds the possibility of a new clinic tucked along the hills serving more than 10,000 who live within walking distance. Thanks be to God for what we can do as we answer the call to love the beloved. Listen for God's call in your life.

#### **New Bern**



During the fall of 2018, Hurricane Florence devastated Eastern North Carolina. To us watching the events on TV, the flooding was historic. To the people watching their homes and possessions being destroyed, the flooding was devastating.

In September, Cliff Christian, Chair of the Missions Council, asked our congregation to raise funds to send to First Baptist Church, New Bern, to help with the immediate needs in their area. The good folks of First Baptist Church of Asheville responded and \$22,000 was sent. First Baptist Church, New Bern, used the funds to help people in their congregation as well as others in New Bern and the surrounding area.

The money was needed and was timely, but money alone would not repair the damage caused by the storms. Three First Baptist Church of Asheville groups made the journey to New Bern to put hands and feet to our commitment. Our first group traveled to New Bern on October 24-28, to help with the "mudout phase" of disaster relief, cleaning out three homes. Another group cooked breakfast for the team and also worked in a food distribution center where they handed out more than 200 meals. In November, Team Two hung and floated sheetrock in the Christian Faith Assembly Church in Trenton. Team Three landed in new Bern over this past MLK weekend and again worked in the St. Stephen's Church hanging sheet rock. A second group worked repairing a house across the street from the church.






#### Rebuilding

On Thursday, January 17, eight of us traveled on the bus to First Baptist Church, New Bern, to assist with rebuilding efforts from the devastation caused by Hurricane Florence. There were three other missionaries who arrived by separate vehicle. The 11 of us all got together Thursday night, had a meal together, and received our instructions for the following day's work from Daynette Snead, our contact, who was familiar with the area, the people, and the priorities that the rebuilding tasks required.

Having previously done a mission trip to New Bern, and especially hard-hit Trenton in November, it was refreshing to see that the tearing out of dwellings we had done in November was replaced with rebuilding and working to get structures habitable again. Because of the volume of water produced by this storm, there was little of the typical "mudding" that ensued post-hurricane.





Upon arriving in Trenton, Daynette assigned us to St. Stephens Church, one of seven churches adversely affected by Florence. Several of the team members worked there and the remaining team members worked at a dwelling that was waiting to be occupied by two sisters and their brother who would watch us daily getting the residence habitable.

St. Stephens Church had electricity and water restored. The responsibility of the team there was sheetrock taping and applying mud. The dwelling we worked in was a double-wide mobile home. When we arrived the mobile home had been stripped to the walls and was awaiting additional insulation.

We insulated the home, beginning at 9:00 a.m., and at noon, the inspector came. He inspected our work and gave the okay to commence hanging sheetrock. By the first day's end we had a quarter of the residence's walls covered. By the end of the following day we had completed three quarters of the dwelling and had run out of sheetrock.

We went to Trenton to continue working at St. Stephens Church with the whole team prior to departing. As we continued working there, two gentlemen from the church described the ordeal of enduring the hurricane. The men were unabashedly thankful for God's grace through our arrival and work. They were frank in their admission of how the attention and the hard work performed by the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship (CBF) and North Carolina Baptist Men was instrumental in their hopes for the future.

Much work remains to be done there and I will be returning in short order to shore up the great needs of our brothers and sisters living to the east.
