



his issue of Highlights hits the stands as the season of Lent commences. For Christians around the world, these 40 days (excluding Sundays) from Ash Wednesday to Easter direct our full attention to penitence and fasting. One seasonal change you'll notice in our Sunday morning worship service, immediately following the invoca-

tion, is a more direct focus on the confession of sin and assurance of pardon. Wednesday evening vespers services, prompted by the third chapter of *Via Karis*, will invite deeper reflection on the theme of "table." Each vespers will offer invitations for both communion and anointing with oil for healing.

If every season in the church year has an inherent mood, we might say the mood of Lent is one of solemnity or deep sincerity. It's a time for the serious examination of our lives and our communal life, guided by liturgies of remembering Christ's temptations, teachings, passion, death, and, finally, his resurrection.

I used to dread Lent. Rather than look forward to it as a unique opportunity, I associated Lent more with wet, cold weather and intentional deprivation. There was the inevitable question, "What are you giving up for Lent?" *Hmm, I gave up chocolate last year. Maybe French fries this year?* Only more recently have I begun thinking of Lent as an opportunity for genuine transformation in Christlikeness.

Last year, for example, I preached on Ash Wednesday about an app I'd just installed on my phone called "WeCroak." For each of forty days, I announced, I would receive five random, sobering reminders that I was going to die, along with a poignant quote. Sound like fun? In fact, it was. Sort of. The point of it all was to help me appreciate *life*. And it did just that. That season of introspection invited me to live a fuller life with my impending death in mind. The app helped me appreciate and savor "ordinary" things with renewed delight, inviting me to appreciate friendships, work, my children, and even food, with new eyes and ears—and a fuller heart. I guess you could say my Lenten sacrifice last year was to give up taking life for granted. And though I may not be wise in comparison to the wise, on the other side of Lent 2019, I'm wiser than I used to be.

Maybe, in all your busyness, you haven't yet decided what to give up for Lent. Or, perhaps, you've sworn off such Lenten devotionals for whatever reason. Please know that I honor your dissent, and may well join up with your ranks again someday.

But if you're still in the game (and still reading this), might I invite you to think of Lent less as a time of self-deprivation, and more as time of *preparation*. Preparation for what? I submit that the season of Lent is most faithfully approached as preparation for...being prepared.

Remember the Parable of the Foolish Bridesmaids (Matthew 25:1-11). Ten bridesmaids take their lamps and go to meet the bridegroom. Five are foolish, and five are wise. When the foolish take their lamps, they take no oil with them; but the wise take flasks for their lamps. The bridegroom gets stuck in traffic and arrives so late that he finds all ten of them asleep. When the shout comes at midnight to come out and meet him, the five foolish bridesmaids plead with the five wise ones to share their oil, "Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out." But the wise say, "Sorry, no can do—there isn't enough for you and us. The store's still open if you want to buy more. But you better hurry back!" But they don't make it back in time. The door to the party is shut. When they knock, the Lord cracks it open just wide enough to tell them, "I'm sure I don't know you."

It's a sobering ending, not to mention very rude of Jesus. And yet, in light of Lent's purpose, it begins to make perfect sense. If we imagine the oil has to do with a kind of "inner reservoir" of wisdom, it is simply non-transferable. Such wisdom can't be bought in time when we really need it. Nor can we borrow it from others in an emergency. Wisdom comes to us through advanced, and often painstaking, preparation—through prayer, fasting, self-examination, almsgiving, and listening for God. Wisdom takes years to build up. Wisdom, finally, takes a lifetime of preparation.

This Lent, let's wonder along with one another what it means to store up for ourselves the treasures of wisdom, so that, whenever the bridegroom finally does show up, and the shout goes out at midnight, we're not caught scrambling, but well-prepared to enjoy a banquet of truly biblical proportions.

Our word on March 18 will be FOLLOW. We will pray Psalm 23. "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the LORD my whole life long." We will think of ways we can follow God, our shepherd.

Our word on March 25 will be WAIT. We will pray Psalm 130. "I wait for the LORD, my soul waits, and in his word I hope." We will consder what it means to wait on God.

Our word on April 1 will be TRUST. We will pray Psalm 31. "But I trust in you, O LORD; I say, 'You are my God.'" We will think about how we can trust God.

("English
Way") is
one of many
ancient

pilgrim routes that Christians would use for inward and outward spiritual journeys. Records go back as far as the 11th century for pilgrims from northwestern Europe (notably England) traveling by sea to northwest Spain, then on foot to Santiago, which is a hub for multiple camino routes. Some of these routes are quite long,

taking many weeks to complete. This one is fairly short, just 75 miles (120 km) and running from Ferrol to Santiago.

What do you actually do on a Camino? Walk. Think. Learn. Greet. Rest. Pray. It involves daily hiking, moving through various small towns until you reach your daily end point. We've paced this one to be active but not too strenuous, ranging from 8-16 miles/day. There are no pressures to go a certain speed or stay together, and the route is well marked and maintained. Some will go faster and finish the day earlier in the afternoon while others will go slower (there is no "correct" pace for this!).

Update on Mission Trips CUBA January 16-26, 2020



David Bourne, Jeanette & Cliff Christian, Susan & Bill Loftis, Steve Metcalf, and Martha & Jim Worley traveled to Las Tunas Cuba to visit our friends at the Elohim Church.

The members of the Elohim

Church were interested in starting a music education program. FBCA members donated the instruments. When we started unloading the instruments, everyone was so excited! "We have been praying for a way to start a praise band for so long, but we didn't have any instruments."

Through the leadership of the Sixth Grade Rocks water filter project, we were able to replace all of the aging water filters. These filters are used on a daily basis to provide clean water to the families that live around the church.

During the 15th Anniversary Service, we were able to present the liturgical stole to Maura, the pastor. A prayer was offered in Spanish and English, and when we placed the stole around her neck, she later told us that she "trembled."



We always have a "partnership meeting" to update each other on events happening in each church. Maura told us about the "Pig Project," which is a joint venture with a neighboring church. They already had a farm, a

farmer, a pig pen, a way to grow the feed, but didn't have any pigs. They wanted to start with five – one to provide food for the communities, one brood pig, and three to raise and sell for profit. We were excited about the vision and sustainability of this project, and because of the generosity of the FBCA members through the 6th grade fund raiser, we were able to invest in this project by providing the money to purchase the 5 pigs and the needed commercial feed. FBCA and Elohim are now partners in the great "Pig Project."

Our children sent books to the Cuban children. Each child selected a book, signed it, and a photo was placed inside of the cover. One of our Cuban friends saw the books in the suitcase, and exclaimed, "Libros!!!"



The current embargo has created many shortages. As requested, our team was able to help alleviate some of the shortages by taking medicines such as vitamins, and aspirin, plus 40 pairs of reading glasses.

Cooperative Baptist Fellowship (CBF)in Haiti, helped to coordinated our clinics.

The team had busy, successful clinics at four sites up on the mountains above Grand Goave. One of these sites was Mogandu, which is the future site of the permanent clinic Jenny and CBF hope to build there. We were

honored to be the first team to work there, albeit under

tarps, and visited by chickens, goats, and lambs.

We had some interesting challenges, including fixing a broken generator, a five mile hike down the mountain in 95 degrees, one sick team member with a GI

bug, one dentist working two chairs, heavy rain with a leaking tent, and a ten hour van ride back to PaP, with no bathroom break. Everyone handled it all with grace and humor. We practiced degaje, or "to make do with what you have." We are all grateful to this church for supporting this ministry. -Bob Busey





The Reverend Dr. Richard Lischer to Preach on Palm Sunday

We welcome the Reverend Dr. Richard Lischer to the pulpit on Palm Sunday, April 5. A native of St. Louis, and ordained in the Evangelical Lutheran Church, Lischer taught homiletics and ministry at Duke Divinity School for nearly 40 years. Throughout his work, Lischer has explored the interactions of preaching, politics, and contemporary culture, and has lectured widely in



the areas of practical theology, ministry, religious autobiography, and preaching. He has held many distinguished lectureships, including the Lyman Beecher Lectures at Yale Divinity School. Lischer received a Lifetime Achievement Award in 2007 from the Academy of Homiletics. His theological memoir, *Open Secrets: A Memoir of Faith and Discovery*, evokes the hidden dynamics of ministry in a small-town parish. A second memoir, *Stations of the Heart: Parting with a Son*, commemorates his son, Adam, who died in 2005. He recently published a 2nd edition of *The Preacher King: Martin Luther King, Jr. and the Word that Moved America*. Since retiring from Duke, Lischer has continued teaching and preaching, and traveling with his partner, Tracy, a retired lawyer in Durham, NC.
